Capital Projects Committee has an expenditure of \$160M this year for projects including:

- Steveston Britannia Shipyard's traditional historic site for reparation.
- Richmond Seniors and Arts Centre is now active for hosting meetings.
- Upgrading mechanical equipment at Richmond Curling Club and Richmond Ice Centre.
- Updating and improving accessibility for seniors in Garden City Lands, Steveston-London Neighborhood Parks, etc.

7. Committee Report

Sports Hosting - Report by Jordan

- Last year, received extra fund from partnership with Tourism Richmond as part of the Richmond Sports Hosting Grant.
- This year, partnership will continue, aiming for a budget of at least \$150,000.
- 3 Intakes per year; Hoping to fund local sports events, major or minor in the coming years.

Membership Committee - Report by Stuart

- Might talk to Board of Directors about welcoming recreational activity groups.
- Committee has a list and will start a membership drive.

Active Recreation & Sports Fund - update - Report by Karen

- Received \$5,000 from the City to open the program last September;
- Gave out \$2,300 to 7 different athletes until last December.
- Able to give out the remaining \$2,700 since early last week.
- Looking for a volunteer joining Karan review applications, work is remote.
- Applied for the City's PRCE grant (max. \$5,000), will find out the result in March. Will need a Sports Council member to help if approved.
- Clarified the selection criteria. Directed some applicants previously with provincial sports organizations to KidSport.
- Fund may cover spring break, winter camps and dance.
- Appreciation to Karen for taking on the responsibilities.

8. Wall of Fame:

No meeting scheduled yet.

9. KidSport:

Report by Bob - Report attached.

- In December, 21 cases approved, gave out \$9,000+.
- Tonight, just reviewed and approved 22 out of 23 applications.
- Last year, ~\$160,000 were given out to 360 recipients. Only \$3,000 spent on administration.
- Number of grants increased by ~30%, amount (\$) increased by ~32.5%.

- Will have a special meeting in January to plan new ways to fundraise.

10. New Business:

Gaming Grant Workshop

- Easy to set up, can be part of a Sports Council meeting or a separate session.
- Free admission, people from the Gaming Grant Org. would explain the application, provide feedback and answer questions.

KidSport™ Richmond Report to Richmond Sports Council Tuesday, January 9, 2024

KidSportTM Richmond Meeting held on December 12, 2023

21 cases approved 10 Boys 11 Girls Amount of Grants - \$6,68.85 \$4,134.30 \$5,691.55

12 Local Community Sports Groups received a grant(s) for an athlete(s)

Next KidSportTM Richmond Meeting was today January 9, 2024

Currently, we had 23 new applications for this January 9th meeting 12 boys and 11 girls' applications for a total of \$8,516.13 for 13 local sports organizations.

KidSportTM Richmond Grants To Local Community Sports to Date in 2023

In 2023, KidSport Richmond has approved:

365 grants 199 for boys (55%) 166 for girls (45%) \$159,969.26 in grants (46%) \$86,437.91 for boys (54%) \$73.531.35 for girls (46%)

In 2022 KidSport Richmond Funded

In 2022, 278 Kids received a grant from KidSport Richmond for a total of \$118,736

Difference from 2022 to 2023

Number grants increased from 278 to 365 = 31% increase Total amount of grants increased from \$118,736 to \$159,969.26 = 35% increase

Richmond Curling Club Report

Roundtable from Serj Sangara

"Since the issue was raised at the start of the meeting in regards to "How the baseball AT INFIELD project jumped up on the Facility Task Force List", (and answered by Councillor Bill McNulty) I feel compelled to share that The Dugout Club in working with Baseball BC, the BCASF, the R&S Sangara Family Foundation and any others interested in developing sports opportunities in East Richmond is very much still on the table.

A fund is being created throughout those groups to support Youth Baseball right here in Richmond rather than going through the National organizations with no guarantees the funds would make their way back to B.C. let alone Richmond.

In wanting to be as transparent as possible, we would still offer approximately \$150,000 towards and AT INFIELD as a straight donation providing it actually went towards the AT INFIELD.

As well, we're hoping we could somehow begin a "Partnership" with the City of Richmond in which we would arrange funding up to approximately 1 million dollars in the hopes we could work it out over time to recoup those funds. This would be similar to the arrangement made by the City of Delta with a private group in their construction of new diamonds, washrooms, changing rooms and INDOOR HEATED BATTING CAGE FACILITIES at Cromie Park in Ladner.

If anyone would like any further information on what we're hoping to accomplish there, please let me know.

From my end though, we've been asking for quite some time as to what funds are available to go towards any field improvements from the USER FEES that are being collected in the hopes that there's even the slightest chance of getting a REGULAR BASEBALL DIAMOND back into East Richmond in the meantime."
